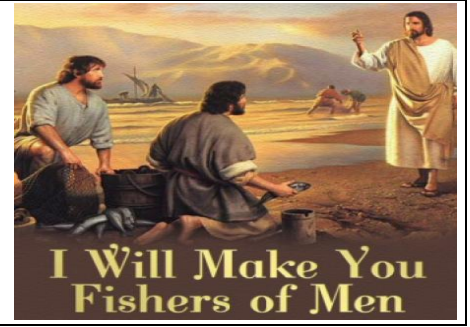

ST. BRIDGET'S DAY – CANDLEMAS – BLESSING OF THE THROATS

St. Bridget's Day: It will not be possible to leave rushes and the other materials in churches this year – instead, some volunteers have made St. Bridget's crosses that will be left in the churches on St. Bridget's day.

Candlemas Day: This past year more than any, people have listened and/or watched Mass at home. Many have created a sacred or prayer space where they have put crucifix or holy or religious picture along with blessed candles and holy water on a white cloth on the kitchen or coffee table. The traditional time households had candles blessed for their homes was February 2nd, known as Candlemas Day – 40 days after Christmas Day. This year, due to current restrictions, and with no public liturgies allowed, a large table will be available in the church where people can leave their candles prior to Candlemas Day. Please clearly **MARK** your candles and **ENSURE** they are separate from other candles. The candles will be blessed at a vigil Mass on the **February 2nd**. Following Mass, the church will be open for the blessing of throats, at which time you can collect your candles or alternative over the following days. In keeping with tradition, a basket will be available also if people wish to contribute candles to the church for the coming year.

Blessing of throats on St Blaise's Day: The blessing of throats may take place in the following manner. Fr. Vivian will be available immediately after Mass for anyone who may the blessing of the throat. The blessing will take place according to social distancing norms. Crossed candles will be used for the blessing, but no physical contact is to take place between the person and the candles. People are asked to wear a face mask and/or appropriate PPE.

Diocesan Pastoral Centre Collection 31st January 2021: On January 31st, the diocesan collection for the Diocesan Pastoral Centre will be held. There is a designated white envelope in the parish envelope box for this collection. The Diocesan Pastoral Centre in Newtownsmith represents the pooled resources of all the parishes in our diocese for the purposes of bringing out the full potential of every person and every parish community. This collection supports programs such as parish faith development, bible studies and sacramental preparation. Your contribution allows the pastoral centre to support priests and parish groups in bringing out the gifts of all the baptised for the building-up of vibrant Christian communities. This collection supports the ongoing development in theology, spirituality and life-giving liturgy such as presentation talks to the EM & Lector, bible studies as well as pastoral council presentations and safeguarding and vetting in parishes throughout the diocese including Shrule.

A WORD IN YOUR EAR

America is a strange contradiction in many ways. It insists on the separation of Church and State, yet the American flag flies behind the main altar in Catholic Churches there. But if we look closely at the Constitution, we will see that the claims of the secular and the sacred are cleverly balanced. The First Amendment guarantees freedoms concerning religion, expression, assembly, and the right to petition. It forbids



Congress from both promoting one religion over others and also restricting an individual's religious practices. In other words, the church should not rule over the state, and the state cannot rule over the church. Religion is too important to be a government programme or a political pageant. So the place of religion in the Public Square is regulated rather than eliminated. We saw a good example of this public 'regulation' of religion at the inauguration of the President on Wednesday last.

Sixty years ago, America's first Catholic President, JFK, was campaigning. In those days, Catholic politicians were viewed with open suspicion by many Protestant groupings. Catholic candidates were accused of having "dual loyalties" to both the Vatican and the United States. Kennedy famously sought to address this issue head-on in a debate on live TV: "I am not the Catholic candidate for president. I am the Democratic Party's candidate for president, who happens also to be a Catholic. I do not speak for my church on public matters, and the church does not speak for me."

Meanwhile, the world has changed, changed utterly. Today, in the American context at any rate, abortion is the yardstick of Catholic orthodoxy. A ferociously conservative rightwing Church will chase a 'heretic' to hell and back! And Joe Biden has been in their cross-hairs for some years!

Kennedy's Catholicism was a problem for many Protestants, but not for his fellow Catholics. Joe Biden's Catholicism is not a problem for most Protestants or secular groups. However, it is a big problem for a number of his fellow Catholics. But the world is more complex today. John Kennedy never had to answer questions on abortion, on same sex marriage, on LGBTQ issues.

Catholicism has changed too, obviously. It is more diverse and more divided than it was 60 years ago. "Catholic in name only" was a charge levelled against Biden during the campaign. Perhaps now is the time to promote the diversity of Catholic social teaching rather than seeing it through the singular lens of abortion?

But, from a Catholic perspective, the one major change that has taken place is that, in the 1960s, Catholics were still perceived as outsiders and as a minority, especially in politics. In the last 60 years, they have become the single largest church in the country. We now have many Catholics in politics, like the Speaker of the House, five justices on the Supreme Court. But at the same time, Catholicism has become much more polarized.

Here is the real dilemma: Catholicism in America is much more progressive than in any other country. And Catholic conservatism is much more conservative than in any other country. And so we have a divided church where the middle ground is impossible to find. The genuine faith of President Joe Biden can only be understood against this background.

WEATHERING THE STORM

The Gospel of St. Mark records numerous miracles performed by Christ during his life on earth. Many of them were witnessed by large crowds most of whom were seeking his healing touch – the feeding of the multitudes, the raising of the dead to life, the curing of lepers, changing water into wine etc. However one of the most stunning episodes was his walking on the waters as the disciples struggled rowing into heavy headwinds in the storm. Fearing for their safety, he came, much to their dismay and went to the boat with them and calmed the storm. 'Fear not', he said to them.

That particular narrative is very symbolic of the current trend of Covid-19. The world for all practical purposes is held hostage by the effects of this virus, where thousands are dying and all of us living in fear and trepidation. Notwithstanding the impact of the virus much of our traditional lifestyle has been disrupted in spite of the fact that a vaccine has been found that hopefully will curtail the spread of this global virus. It poses for us a deep sense of discernment as to how we can cope with its ill effects.

Apart from the fact that the first case of Covid seems to have originated in Wuhan, China. However the primary cause has raised many questions but scientists for centuries have conducted various tests and concluded that the extinction of millions of the earth's species has had a dramatic effect on the order of nature and subsequently our relationships with the natural world has been disrupted. Over the past year one hundred scientists have produced papers outlining scientifically the effects of our human exploitation of nature particularly the destruction of forests, wetlands and environment. Pope Francis himself said 'we the exploiters end up being the greater victims of nature's destruction of the bio-diversity.' Over the past fifty years some 40% of the world's population is threatened with severe floods, food shortage and human disasters, the dichotomy between the rich and the poor growing larger. It is clearly evident that billions of people across the globe are forced to leave their homeland because of environmental disasters in justice and violence and seek to refuge in other areas.

As humans and especially as Christians we have to acknowledge that God created a world with natural resources to sustain us in life. We have now reached an impasse calling on the world to not only protect our living environment but to share the goods of the earth equally. It is difficult to assume that this has been the norm when we read of such violations of greed and inequality. For example in 2017/2018 \$3.2 trillion was expended in militarism while almost 30% of the world's population live in want.

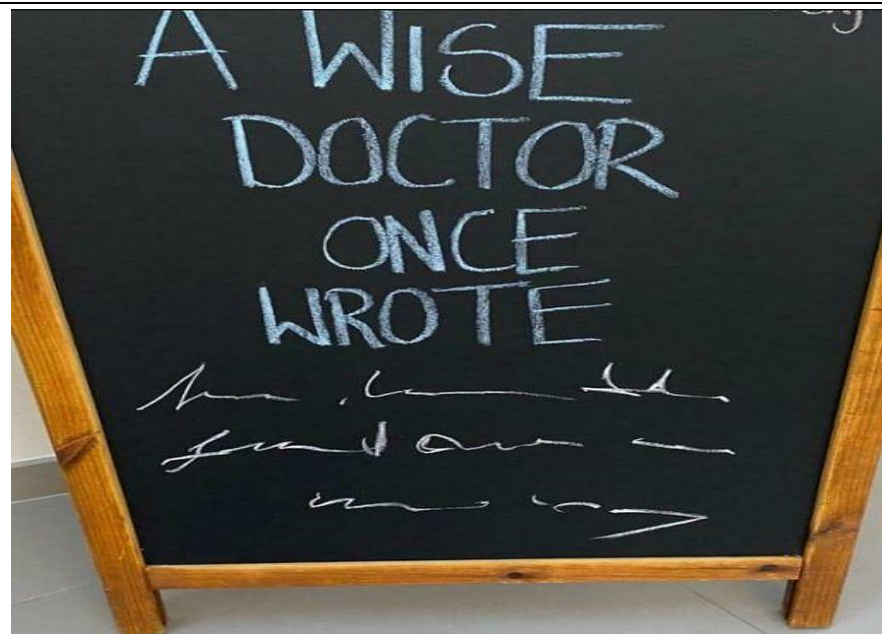

FR MICHAEL KENNY, RIP

On the First Sunday of Lent, 2019, we printed this little 'seasonal teaser' in the parish missalette, together with this accompanying picture. It concerned a priest from the diocese of Tuam. It was a light-hearted piece, intended to alert people to the old practice of attending Mass for Lent. It ran as follows:

Despite the controversies which have rocked the church in recent years and the resulting fall-off in attendances at church services, Fr Michael Kenny has been packing them in at his Kilconly parish in Co Galway.

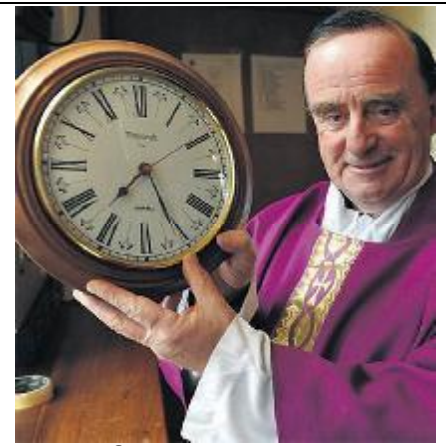
The popular priest started his 15-minute Mass as nothing more than an experiment at the start of Lent. And he attributes the speed of the service to foregoing a sermon -- and having the help of a Eucharistic minister for communion.

Fr Kenny decided to bring the time back from 9.00 am to 7.30am and guarantee he would keep parishioners no longer than a quarter of an hour.

Attendances at the small north Galway parish church have now soared to between 30 and 40, with Mass-goers walking out the door by 7.45 am. Fr Kenny explained that he was very conscious of the work commitments of his parishioners when he opted to try out the quickie Mass at 7.30am.

He decided to abandon the usual sermon and enlisted the help of a minister of the Eucharist to ensure that the congregation would be on its way by 7.45 am..

Unfortunately, Fr Mick was found dead on Sunday morning last, on lands close to his family home near Ballyhaunis. A post mortem later confirmed that he died from natural causes. According to his friend, Fr Stephen Farragher, the popular pastor regularly enjoyed walks in the countryside. He said: "Along with his dog, Fr Mick regularly walked on lands close to his family home." "Every morning he had a very healthy routine. He would walk down and cross the railway line near his home." "He had just crossed the rail track and was opening a gate when he must have suddenly fallen ill. "His body was found by a rail worker. May he rest in peace.
